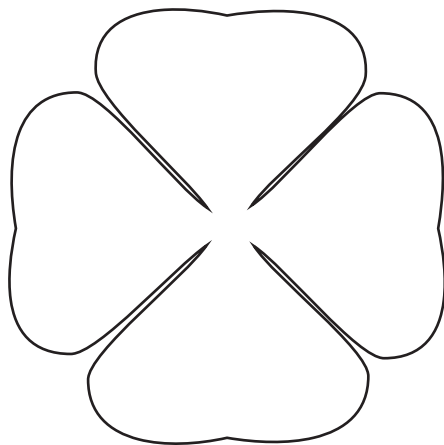
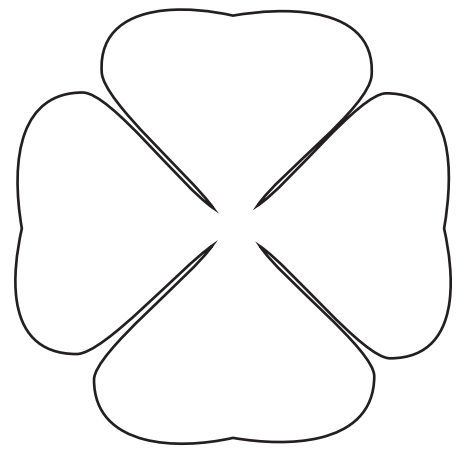
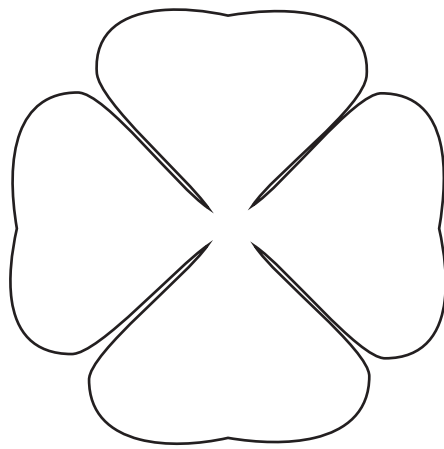
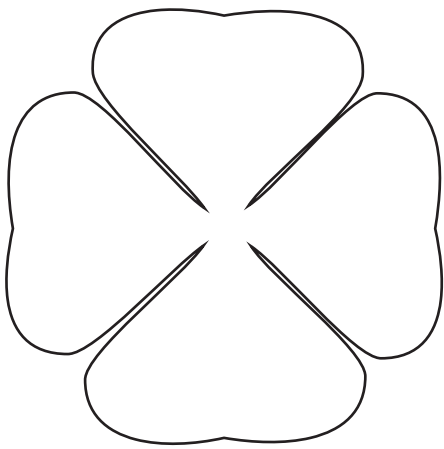
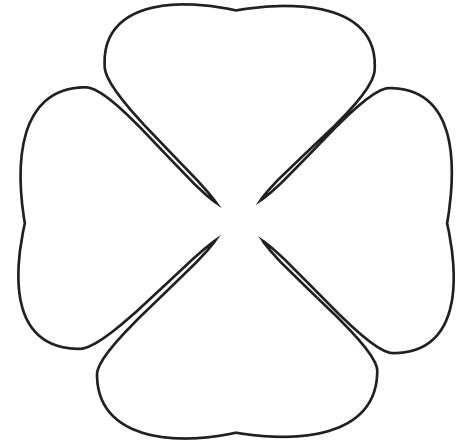
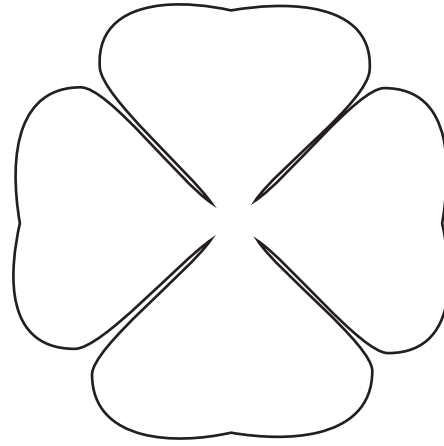
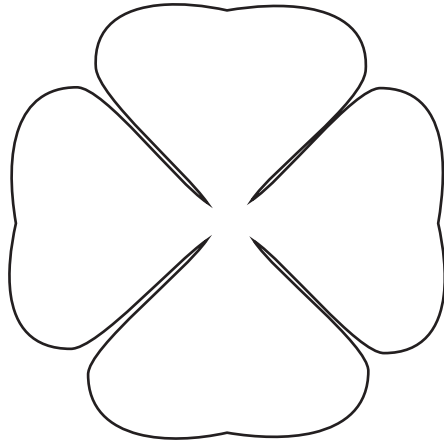
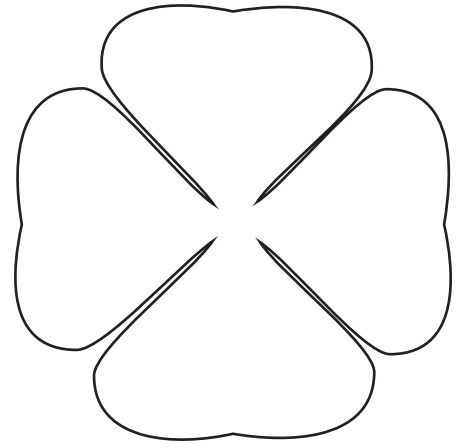
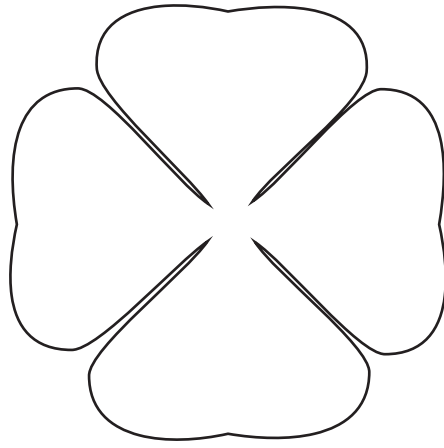
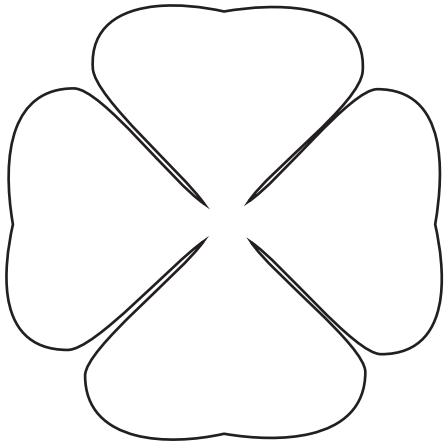


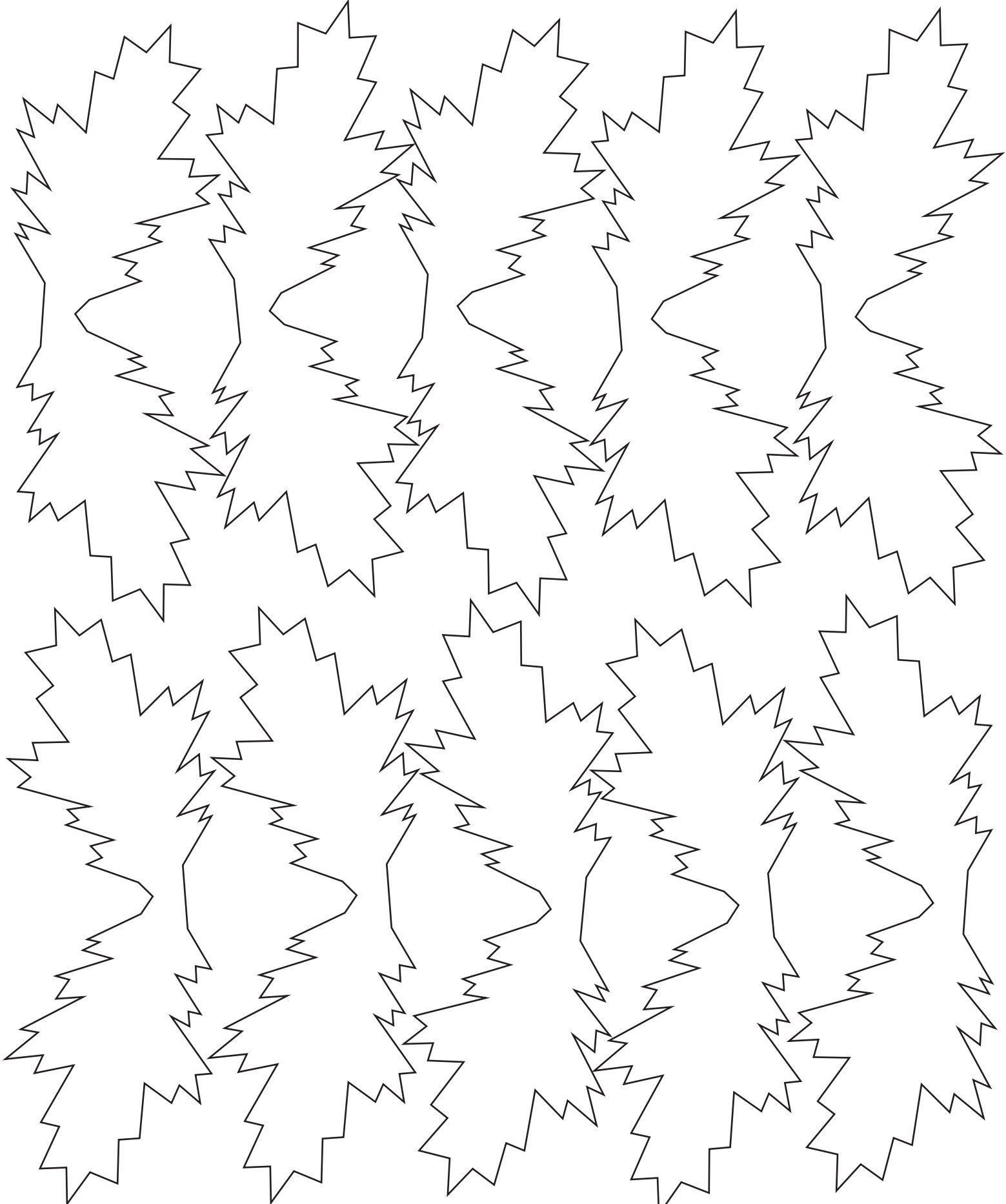
Colouring page background, for use instead of paper flowers

Please note: The main project requires a 20cm box frame. I created it that way as all the components will print onto A4 paper, which the majority have. If you want to use (the popular) IKEA Ribba box frame you will need to use the A3 version of the papercut and print onto A3 paper. The Ribba frame is 23cm wide and A4 paper is only 21cm wide.

The alternative is to print the papercut on A4 and manually cut a 23cm x 23cm mount with a large aperture (hole).

Paper poppies adventure

You will need:

Coloured papers (red, green, black)

Pritt stick (or similar glue)

A 20cm (glass size) box frame.

You can either print the templates on coloured paper to cut out, or you can trace onto tracing/baking paper and transfer to coloured paper the old-fashioned way! The flower centres can be quite fiddly to cut. The flower would look just as good with just black circles if you want to save a bit of time.

Once I'd cut mine I crinkled up the edges of the petals with my thumb and forefinger and scored 'veins' into the leaves by folding and manipulating them - you really don't need to be precious about it.

The flower centre I bent the 'stamens' upwards.

I glued and overlapped the petals of each flower and let dry before glueing the centres in and then sticking the flower onto the leaves.

I spent quite a while arranging the flowers on the backing until they showed through the papercut the way I wanted, before I glued them onto the back of the frame. I actually only used 9 of the 10 poppies in the end.

I then fixed the papercut at the front of the frame, put in the spacer and then finally the backing and voila!

Colouring page adventure

You will need:

Colouring pencils (obvs!)

Scissors

20cm Box frame (optional)

Once the page is coloured and the papercut cut, place the papercut at the front of the frame, then the spacer and then the colouring page at the back.

Alternatively you can fix the colouring page background directly behind the papercut in a regular frame.
